

Bengaluru witnessed a landmark event in the realm of acute neuro care with the "Acute Neuro Care" conference held on December 2nd and 3rd 2023. The event was organized by the Surgical and Neuro Intensive Care Unit, Department of Anesthesia at St. John's Medical College Hospital as part of the diamond jubilee celebrations. 

"Heads Up: A Community United for Brain Safety"

In a heartwarming effort to shine a light on the often overlooked issue of head injuries, the team at St. John's Medical College Hospital's Surgical and Neuro Intensive Care Unit took a big step this World Head Injury Day.

"Restoring Lives, One Patient at a Time" - this powerful theme echoed through the corridors of St. John's Medical College Hospital as doctors, nurses, and nurse practitioners joined hands in a concerted effort to shed light on the critical issue of head injuries. Breast Cancer Related Lymphedema (BCRL)

Breast Cancer Related Lymphedema (BCRL) is a clinically significant health care burden for breast cancer survivors that causes severe physical discomfort. Lymphedema can develop within days postoperatively or can happen years after breast cancer treatment. The common sites include the upper limb, breast and thoracic region. These patients have a lower qualityof-life and there is also said to be a higher likelihood of poorer general health. Over 50% of breast cancer survivors were found to be exceptionally worried about developing lymphedema. There are other complications of lymphedema including repeated episodes of cellulitis and ulceration that may require antibiotic therapy and hospitalization. Diagnosis of upper limb lymphedema depends on a combination of comprehensive history, physical examination with subjective/objective symptoms and physiologic measures. The common subjective clinical symptoms of patients with lymphedema in the upper limb are swelling, numbness, heaviness, tightness, stiffness, decreased coordination and mobility, limb fatigue or weakness. Once BCRL is established, the management focuses on swelling reduction and symptom alleviation while minimizing exacerbations of swelling.

Physical Therapy, is accepted widely as one of the first line of management, for patients with breast cancer related lymphedema. It includes treatments such as Complete Decongestive Therapy or CDT, which incorporates Manual Lymph Drainage (MLD), skin care, specialized exercises, compression garments and patient-education. CDT is divided into Phase I Decongestion, and Phase II Maintenance and should be individualized to improve its effectiveness and contain costs. Exercises are also an integral part of CDT with the aim (1) to promote lymph flow, (2) to mobilize the joints, and (3) to strengthen the muscles. It is widely known that participation in exercises during and after oncological treatment can improve the physical and psychosocial condition, which enhances the quality-of-life. In addition to this, PTs play a pivotal role in prevention of BCRL. Rehabilitation of breast cancer survivors that have undergone surgery, includes exercises & patient education that are critical in preventing BCRL. In overview, BCRL is a debilitating secondary complication of breast cancer patients, and PT can play an important role in managing it. Keep calm & PT on!

CANCER IS DEFEATED! Health Benefits OF PINEAPPLE HOT WATER.

THE CLAIM – A widely circulated message on WhatsApp and the internet claims the following "Please spread the word! Please spread the word! ICBS General Hospital Professor Dr. Gilbert A Kwok insisted that if everyone who received this bulletin could send ten copies to ten people at least one life would be saved.

Pineapple water can save you from cancer. Thinly slice 2 to 3 pieces of pineapple into a cup and add hot water and it will be alkaline water; if you drink it daily it is good for everyone. Hot pineapple water releases anti-cancer substances; it's the latest advancement in medicine for effective cancer treatment...."

The article further makes the claim that substances from pineapple can –

- 'kill tumors and cysts'
- proven to cure all types of cancer
- clears germs and toxins from the body due to allergies
- destroys 'violent' cells and does not affect healthy cells
- polyphenols in pineapple juice and reduce blood clotting and control high blood pressure.

FACT CHECK

WhatsApp

- Pineapple is slightly acidic; no matter how much water is added to dilute it, it does not become alkaline.
- A literature search in PUBMED did not find any articles that have studied the effects of pineapple water or juice in preventing and treating cancer.
- An enzyme called 'bromelain' has been isolated from the stem of the pineapple tree, which in lab studies have shown that they may reduce cell division and induce 'apoptosis' of damaged cells. But human studies do not exist to back up this finding.



CONCLUSION – The claim made in the message is baseless. While pineapple can be a good addition to the diet (in moderation), further studies are required to evaluate whether extracts of pineapple truly have the 'magical' properties put forth in this message.

Department Of Cardiology

Overview of the Department:

The Department of Cardiology, St. John's Medical College, was started in 1984 under the leadership of Lt Gen G R Narayan. The department focuses on providing holistic and compassionate care for all, including underprivileged patients. We were one of the first institutions in the state to introduce Interventional cardiology in 1995 with the inauguration of a digital cardiac catheterization laboratory. With state-of-the-art equipment like a Biplane Catheterization Laboratory, a variety of cardiac and peripheral interventional procedures are routinely performed, with a focus on quality and affordability. Numerous poor patients have been treated at very concessional rates or even free of cost. It is one of the first departments to start a Poor Patients Fund and as far as possible, lifesaving treatment is not withheld for lack of funds.

Location:

Cardiology Department is located on the 3rd floor of the Hospital.

Working hours of the Department: 8.30 AM to 5.00 PM.

Physical Infrastructure:

We have a 7 bedded CCU, 4 bedded step - down CCU, Common ward, Catheterization Laboratory where we perform procedures like Coronary Angiograms, Coronary Angioplasties, Permanent Pacemaker Insertions and peripheral vascular interventions.

The department of Cardiology has regular Morning OPDs (9.00 AM to 1.00 PM) from Monday to Saturday in Rooms 8 and 9 of the Super- speciality block.

Services offered by the department:

Cardiac Interventions:

The Department is well known for the range of coronary and peripheral vascular interventions which have been routinely performed since 2002. These include:

- Coronary Angioplasty and Stenting (PTCA)
- Rotablator Angioplasty and Intravascular lithotripsy (IVL)
- IVUS (intravascular Ultrasound) and FFR / IFR
- Peripheral Angioplasty & stenting (Eg: Renal, Subclavian, Coeliac, Superior Mesenteric Ilio- femoral, femoral, and Popliteal artery stenting, as well as tibial artery angioplasty / stenting.
- Angioplasty of Aorta / IVC. IVC filter insertion and retrieval
- Angioplasty of Hemodialysis AV fistulae, and of central veins.
- Embolization: Bronchial Artery Embolization, Peripheral Artery embolization, and Embolization of AV fistulae.
- Pacemaker implantation, CRT, CRTD, Electrophysiological testing and Ablation for Arrhythmias.



DM course:

The department has been training students for the NMC approved 3-year DM Cardiology program since 2000. A clinical cardiology fellowship course is being offered for post-MBBS and post-MD students. Here, training is given in clinical evaluation of cardiac patients, management of cardiac emergencies, and echocardiography. Besides the routine academic activities and CME programs for MD and DM students and training of elective foreign students, the department is actively involved in research activities and is involved in numerous national and international research trials.

The Cardiology Department of St. John's Medical College currently has 4 consultant Cardiologists.

Dr M A Srilakshmi, Professor and Head, completed DNB Cardiology from the prestigious Narayana Hrudayalaya Institute of Cardiac Sciences and has 14 years' experience in the field, with special interest in Interventional Cardiology and Cardiac Failure.

Risk of fractures with benzodiazepine receptor agonists

Benzodiazepine receptor agonists (BZRAs), including benzodiazepines and nonbenzodiazepine BZRAs such as zolpidem, can cause excess drowsiness and imbalance leading to falls and fractures. In a recent meta-analysis of 20 observational studies in over six million individuals, BZRAs were associated with increased risk of osteoporotic fractures across a range of drug classes and fracture types, with odds ratios ranging from 1.2 to 1.4. Most but not all studies included adults 50 years of age or older. These data reinforce the need for caution in prescribing BZRAs for insomnia and other indications, particularly in older adults.

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<u>Complications of transrectal versus transperineal prostate</u> <u>biopsy</u>

The merit of transrectal versus transperineal prostate biopsy has been vigoroulsy debated. In the first randomized trial comparing these procedures in over 760 patients undergoing biopsies in the office setting, the two approaches had similar rates of both infectious (2.6 versus 2.7 percent) and non-infectious (1.7 versus 2.2 percent) complications. This suggests that both approaches can be performed with a low risk of complications. Antibiotic prophylaxis was given to all patients prior to transrectal biopsy but omitted in most patients undergoing transperineal biopsy.
